INTRODUCTION

THIS MANUAL IS TO BE USED AS A GUIDELINE FOR THE OFFICES OF CHAPLAIN OF BOTH OF THE USSVI AND BASE CHAPLAINS.

IT IS NOT INTENDED TO BE THE DEFINING END ALL TO PERFORMING THE DUTIES OF THE BASE CHAPLAIN – ONLY TO SUPPLY THEM WITH THOUGHTS, OUTLINES AND HELPS TO EQUIP THEM TO DO A SATISFACTORY JOB AND ASSIST THEM TO BE OF SPIRITUAL BLESSING AND TO HELP THEIR SHIPMATES.

CHOOSING A CHAPLAIN

While it would be helpful for the Chaplain to be a member of the Clergy, this is not always possible inside the ranks of our organization.

For obvious reasons, the person considered for the job should be somewhat familiar with the Bible, be able to pray and speak in public.

The office of Chaplain should not be political, and the Chaplain should not have to be elected. Their term of office should be as long as they are able to be of service and only replaced when someone more qualified for the office is available or they desire to relinquish the appointment. While the Chaplain may be an ordained individual, they must perform their duties in a non-denominational manner, i.e. their prayers should not be denominationally specific but general in nature taking into consideration the other members beliefs. Opening and closing with Eternal Father and Almighty God is acceptable to both Jewish faith individuals and Christians.

Naturally, they will be expected to be trustworthy and willing to do sick visitation, both in member's homes and at hospitals. They should also be a compassionate individual.

They will be expected to, as part of their duties, offer short open and closing prayers at the meetings and conduct memorial services at least once annually, and help their shipmates in time of spiritual need. It is not necessary that they hear confessions, but anything said to them in counseling or confidentiality is to remain unspoken. They must never betray a trust.

A memorial or Chaplain's fund should be available to them, from which they can make necessary purchases to meet the needs of their office

The Chaplain should be able to speak in a voice loud enough for all present to hear him. Their prayers, Scripture readings and Memorial Messages are important for every ear to hear. When they are performing the duties of their office, they should also be given the respect worthy of the same. They should wait for attention and not have to compete with other voices or activities when praying or reading Scripture

Sample Prayers to open and close a meeting.

At the end of a Moment of silence for Shipmates on Eternal Patrol if requested.

- A- Eternal Rest grant unto our departed shipmates, Lord, and may their souls and all the souls of the faithful departed rest in peace, Amen!
- B- Bless them and their loved ones and us, their shipmates, now and all through eternity. Amen!
- C- Thank you for the memories we have of our departed shipmates. Be with and strengthen their loved ones and us their Shipmates, we pray. Amen!

Opening Prayers:

A- Eternal Father:

We thank you for the heritage and liberty we enjoy as Americans and for the privilege of having served in the Submarine Service to protect that liberty. We pray Thy blessing and wisdom for our country's leaders. May they seek your guidance as they serve us and the United States. Currently, we remember those of our group who are sick, troubled, and bereaved. Place your healing hand on their bodies and mind, as we pray. Make us patient with our Shipmates, wise in our deliberations, and bless us during this time together. We offer these prayers in your name. Amen!

B- Our Heavenly Father:

We come to you at this time to ask your blessing on our great country, its leaders and that we are its citizens. Thank you that we were able to defend and protect the liberty that we hold so dear. Bless our President and others in public office both at the national, state, and local level. Grace them with your wisdom to guide our nation to greater heights. May we as members be willing to support them in their efforts and to do our part for the good of our country. Bless our sick members and those who are troubled and bereaved. May they feel your healing, strength, and comfort as we remember them just now. Now lord, we ask that you bless our meeting. Give us patience with each other and help this meeting to be helpful to our organization.

These mercies we ask in your name.

Amen!

C- Dear Lord:

We come to you tonight as a thankful people for all your many blessings you have so freely given to us. Help us to be ever mindful of those in our number who are unable to be with us. Place your hand of healing upon the sick and comfort those who mourn. Bless us each individually and guide us to become better shipmates and citizens of this our great country.

We offer these petitions in Thy Name. Amen!

Closing prayers:

A- Dear God, our Heavenly Father.

We are grateful for the privilege we have of meeting and for a safe journey home. Guide us in our ways and give us traveling mercies as we return to our homes and loved ones Amen!

B- May the Lord bless thee and keep thee until we meet again. Amen!

As a note there are denominations that do not use written prayers. The chaplain is encouraged to say prayers that are spontaneous and heartfelt for the situation they are part of, however if it is easier for you to write them down then feel free to do so.

When I mentioned that I was updating the Chaplains manual I was contacted by RD1 (SS) Byrd Saville of the Hampton Roads Base who submitted this prayer that they have used for several years. I have included it as it one that you may want to make use of. Many thanks to RD1(SS) Saville, the Hampton Roads base and the Minister who composed it.

We pray that the Power of the Holy Spirit will flow through all Submariners, That the Grace of God will renew them.

That the Love of God will pursue them Today, Tomorrow, and all of life's tomorrows and may we be born tenderly in the palm of the Almighty till time shall be no more.

When doing the research for the updating of the manual I was fortunate to be able to confer with Rabbi Jeremy Weisblatt of Temple Ohav Shalom located here in the Pittsburgh area. Rabbi Weisblatt was more than gracious to take time from his schedule and meet with me and review and update how our Jewish memorial service should be done. We had the opportunity to go over and formulate a memorial service that would provide the honor and respect for our Jewish members. I am indebted to him for his assistance.

DUTIES OF THE CHAPLAIN

BASE MEETINGS

Each meeting should be opened with a moment of silence for departed shipmates on eternal patrol. A short opening prayer should be offered and then the salute and pledge to the flag.

The Chaplain should be asked to bless the meal if one is being partaken as part of the meeting.

The Chaplain should be called to offer a closing prayer or benediction so all may depart in peace and in the words of the lord.

At each meeting, the Chaplain should be permitted to inform the members of the binnacle list of the base members if so desired and note the passing of any member into Eternal Patrol. If a memorial service was conducted for a member then a summary of who participated and any message from the family can be passed on to the members present.

CHAPLAINS TELEPHONE NUMBER

The Chaplain's telephone number and Email address should be available to all hands so that he can be reached when needed. This information should be in each base newsletter

VISITING THE SICK

The Chaplain should be prepared to visit sick shipmates at home or in the hospital. A 'Get Well' card signed by all attending the meeting should be sent following the meeting. The Chaplain may want to keep on hand several cards that he has had signed at meetings by all hands to send out in these instances.

FUNERALS

The Chaplain should be a leader of the delegation at the funeral of a Shipmate. This service should be conducted after discussing it with the family and obtaining permission and may be held one of the evenings of the wake or visitation at the funeral home, church service or cemetery as requested by the family. For general information you can call the funeral Director in most instances, identify yourself and ask for the Clergy Info package that contains most of the info you might need so as to not have so many questions to ask of the family. If asked to conduct it as part of the church service, you will have to work with the Minister conducting the service and make arrangements. Some churches will not allow this and so you will have to work this out with the family.

In the case of a Jewish member, refer to the appendix of the manual for the Jewish service.

In the case of a Christian member, refer to the appendix for the Christian service.

To assist the base Chaplain there are included sample services that you can copy and paste to help you in conducting a memorial service. Along with the services is included a Final Orders Certificate and a poem that was found on the internet that is modifiable with the members name and rank. This poem was not annotated with the authors information and an exhaustive search was made with none found. As such I am unable to provide recognition to the author. These items are meant to be downloaded and edited by the base Chaplain and used as needed.

The poem and Final Orders certificate can be copied and formatted to fit on one page.

The service should be mindful of the shipmate's family, and always be keyed to comfort the survivors and loved ones of the deceased shipmate. For Jewish services, the detail MUST always remain covered while in the synagogue.

As a note:

For my service, we meet at the funeral home or graveside as arranged with the family. I set the time with the funeral Director in advance always after talking with the family. Once the members are present we obtain the Veterans Flag from the Director and if there are enough people we march in with the flag, the members arrange in ranks by the foot of the casket if possible, I go to the head of the casket and perform the ceremony.

I open by calling the detail to attention, and then order Display the Colors. Three members march out, unfold the flag, open, and display it and then fold the flag. If there are not enough members present to perform this, I merely have the detail hold the colors at attention.

I Read the poem This sailor stood the watch, and then conduct the ceremony. At the conclusion of the service I call the detail to attention and read the Final Orders. I am fortunate enough to have a retired officer who has over the years been very gracious and when we so order he presents the Colors to the Widow or family member so designated. I order for the detail to present the colors, the member holding the folded flag paces out to the center along with the person presenting to the family, the person receiving the Flag salutes and is handed the flag. The first holder then salutes, and the presenter then delivers the colors. If unable to attend I present the Colors myself. I then order the detail to attention and direct them to render honors and to dismiss. Our base renders honors and then they also salute the family. I render honors, present copies of the certificates, and then announce we have concluded our service. The correct verbiage for the flag presentations is as below:

'On behalf of the President of the United States, (the United States Army; the United States Marine Corps; the United States Navy; or the United States Air Force), and a grateful Nation, please accept this flag as a symbol of our appreciation for your loved one's honorable and faithful service.'

MEMORIAL SERVICES

NOTE: Review the policy and procedures Manual (PPM) and/or information posted at www.USSVI.org for complete and detailed instructions.

These are conducted annually, if possible, aboard a submarine – active, reserve, or decommissioned. The afterdeck serves well as a gathering place for the guest and leaders. If space is limited and the guest are numerous, seating can be arranged on the dock for guest and the leaders of the service can use the afterdeck.

All military personnel – active and reserve (especially USN) and the public should be invited, as many as possible in uniform. The public media should also be invited and press releases should be sent out to publicize the service.

The services may consist of such items as:

- Preliminary music (where possible and available)
- A Prayer,
- The pledge to the flag
- A welcome from the highest-ranking base officer present,
- A patriotic hymn,
- A Memorial Day message from the Chaplain (or invited clergyman), appropriate scripture
- The Navy hymn,
- Calling of the roll of Ships on eternal patrol, adding the names of deceased Shipmates since previous annual memorial service,
- The casting of flowers or wreath on the water, a rifle salute
- A memorial prayer, taps,
- A moment of silent prayer and the benediction

The service should be kept quite brief, approximately forty-five (45) minutes. There are sample prayers for the Invocation, presentation of the wreath and Benediction. They are free to be copied and modified as needed.

Guidelines to help the Chaplain with his work

In case of death:

Prepare Eternal Patrol certificate and provide the Eternal Patrol certificate in person when possible or by mail.

Send a card to the family next of kin. Information for ordering a USSVI card can be found in Appendix 3.

Ask the family if they would desire a memorial service for the shipmate on eternal patrol.

For retired members provide information from the retiree checklist on how to stop the deceased retirement pay.

If the deceased veteran is buried in a private cemetery the family is eligible to receive a head stone or Memorial emblem for the head stone.

In case of illness of a shipmate or his immediate family:

A card, signed by the membership if possible, should be sent to the Shipmate as soon as possible and followed up with other cards if the illness is prolonged. Visit the Shipmate at the hospital or at his home. Please note that when a shipmate has been stricken with major illness or a terminal condition they may not desire to be visited. It is not that they are to sick, but most do not wish to have their shipmates remember them in that condition.

Counseling:

There may be occasions when the Chaplain will be called upon by a shipmate to listen to his problems. These problems may be of a very confidential nature. They are never trivial and most certainly are important to the shipmate who carries them. He may not wish to share them with his spouse, Minister/pastor/priest or anyone else but he needs someone to talk to - frequently that someone will often find the answer to his problems by simply talking openly about them to someone he can trust. This part of the Chaplain's duties should be kept strictly confidential

The below checkoff list is from the Military.com web site. Military .com has pages and pages of helpful tips, hints and resources for the military retiree and military spouses.

The following checklist should be reviewed by military retirees and their beneficiaries on an annual basis. This checklist is designed to equip you and your loved ones with knowledge and information that may prove helpful. While it may be impossible to truly prepare for the overwhelming emotions and dilemmas that arise with the loss of a loved one, it does help when most of the below issues have been put into place.

___ Create a military file that includes your retirement orders, separation papers, medical records, etc. Make sure your spouse knows the location and telephone number of the nearest military installation.

___ Create a military retired pay file that includes the pertinent information for DFAS

(This file should also include the number of any VA claim still pending and the address of the VA office being used; a list of deductions currently being made from benefits; and the name, relationship and address of the person you have made the beneficiary of any unpaid retired pay at the time of death.)

___ Create an annuities file. This file should have information about the Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP), Reserve Component Survivor Benefit Plan (RCSBP) or the Retired Serviceman's Family Protection Plan (RSFPP), Civil Service annuity, etc. Additional information regarding SBP annuity claims can be obtained from the DFAS-Cleveland office at 800-321-1080.

___ Create a personal document file that has copies of marriage certificates, divorce decrees, adoptions and naturalization papers.

___ Create an income tax file. Include copies of your state and federal income tax returns.

___ Create a property tax file. Include copies of tax bills, deeds and any other related information.

___ Create an insurance policy file. Include life, property, accident, liability and hospitalization policies.

__ In a secure location, maintain a list of all bank accounts (joint or individual). Include the location of all deposit boxes, savings bonds, stocks, bonds and any securities owned.

__ In a secure location, maintain a list of all charge accounts and credit cards. Include account numbers and mailing addresses.

__ Maintain a list of all associations and organizations of which you are a member. Some of them could be helpful to your spouse.

__ Maintain a list of all friends and business associates who may be helpful. Include name, address and phone number.

__ Spend time with your spouse discussing your plans with respect to the type and place of your funeral service. You should decide which cemetery, whether ground burial, or cremation, etc. If your spouse knows your desires, it will resolve some of the questions that might arise at a later date.

__ Visit a local funeral home and pre-arrange your services. Many states will allow you to pre-pay for services.

__ Investigate the decisions that you and your family have agreed upon.

Many states have specific laws and guidelines regulating cremation and burials at sea. Some states require a letter of authority signed by the deceased in order to authorize a cremation. Know the laws in your specific area and how they may affect your decisions. Information regarding Burials at Sea can be obtained by phoning the Navy Mortuary Branch within the Navy Casualty Assistance Division ensures prompt and uniform death benefits are provided to all Navy beneficiaries worldwide. Included as be at 866-787-0081.

__ Once your decisions have been made and you are comfortable with them, have a will drawn up outlining all your wishes. __ Ensure that your will and all other official documents are maintained in a secure location known by your loved ones. This includes all of your DD214s or Retirement Orders. __ When all the decision-making and documenting is completed, sit back and continue to enjoy life.
